From the Pastor:

Every morning an email arrives in my mailbox with a daily devotional from the UCC's Stillspeaking Writers Group. I usually find something in it to ponder throughout the day. This Monday's reflection gave me a lot to think about. Here it is:

Join a Church by Mary Luti

Above all, love each other deeply... Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace. -1 Peter 4:8-10 (NIV)

I know an old woman who worries about outliving her partner and most of her family and friends. The grief of that anticipated loss messes with her sleep. And the fear. With them gone, who'll look out for her? She doesn't want to die alone.

She confided all this to a friend. His advice? Join a church. Church people will take care of you, he said. You won't be alone.

She was taken aback by how crass and self-interested his advice felt. Hi, I'm Sally, I'm old and getting older. I'm joining your church so I won't be alone. What kind of reason is that? If people knew she'd come hoping for a few visits and a casserole someday, wouldn't they feel used? She decided he must be kidding. He wasn't.

I don't know whether she'll do it, but I hope so, because her friend is right. Anyone who's ever been lucky enough to be part of a loving church knows it. To approach such a community for company and care isn't selfish. It's giving that church a chance to be church.

Some Christians think that the church is most fully what Christ intends only when it's publicly engaged in the struggle against the sinful systems of our unjust world. But the world's axis also tilts towards God's dream whenever some random old woman (or anyone at all) comes to us to be accompanied and is met with open arms.

Join a church. They'll take care of you.

Prayer

Compassionate Christ, open your church's arms to the lonely and fearful, no matter who, no matter why, no matter when. Amen.

When I read this, my first thought was, "This is so true!" I have seen it happen again and again. Recent widows or widowers often feel lost after the death of their spouses. They show up on a Sunday not even knowing what they are seeking. In a relatively short period of time they are invited to go out to lunch or join a Bible study. They are brought into the fold and quickly become part of the church family. Before you know it, we are praying for the newcomer's health issues or family members and driving them to the doctor. And if they need chicken soup or a casserole is needed during recovery, the church ladies make it happen. I smiled as I recalled the dear friends I've made over the years with elders who came to church at a vulnerable and fearful time. (And not just elders, young people too!)

That was my first thought. My second thought was to wonder if reaching out to elders in Affton might be Trinity's calling. A number of us are dealing with aging issues ourselves. We know what it is like to be fearful or lonely. Just imagine . . . we might find experience, strength and hope as we share our lives with others who are going through the same thing. It would be a blessing to us, to them, and to the community to have an outreach to seniors. Who might we partner with to do this kind of ministry? A senior center? Meals on Wheels? Individual neighbors?

I don't know. It's just a thought. I share it to see what you might imagine. If you want to explore it further, let me know.

In just a few weeks we will begin the season of Lent. This season invites us into a time of prayer and reflection and spiritual preparation for Easter.

On February 19th, our service with conclude with the imposition of ashes, and all who wish may come forward to receive the mark of Ashes.

Each Sunday during Lent we will light a candle as a reminder of our intentions to grow spiritually through the season. We will look at temptation, willingness, faith/doubt, promise, confession and sacrifice prayerfully ask God to prepare us for resurrection and new life with Christ on Easter Sunday.

With council's encouragement, we are making some changes in the service. Lent invites us to be open to seeing ourselves and God in a new perspective. (This will be OK. We will return to the familiar on Easter. Let's give it a try!)

On March 12 and March 26, we will stay after worship for a simple soup luncheon and table conversation. This will give us some informal social time and opportunities to notice what God is doing among us.

On April 2nd we will have a combined Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday (with the last supper), and Good Friday service to lead us into Holy Week.

May this Lenten season be a time of grace and transformation for us all!

Lenten Mission Project

This year we will collect items to assemble hygiene kits for Church World Service. Please bring one or more items to add to our kits each week. It will be fun to watch our collection grow each week, and after Easter we will have a "Boxing Day" to assemble the kits and box them up to send to Church World Service.

- 2/26: Fingernail or Toenail Clippers (either size is OK)
- **3/5: Toothbrush** (individually wrapped. Do not include toothpaste.)
- 3/12: Bar of Bath Soap (individually wrapped in original packaging)
- **3/19: Hand Towel** (16" x 28")
- **3/26:** Wash Cloth (12' x 12")
- 4/2: Sturdy Wide Tooth Comb (not a pocket comb.)

We will also need some cash donations toward this project so we can cover the \$2 service fee per kit and shipping costs.




I have a request for the Trinity members:
